the help of Steve Buesking, kept everything running smoothly behind the curtains. Doing a fabulous job in the


booth was Steve Levit on lights and Alan Zibits on sound. The show went off without a

Terry Richison welcoming the audience, thanking them for their kind donations and explaining how a contest show works. Terry then



Mentalism effects. The audience was astounded when Larry revealed his predictions. New member Josh Roth was up next. Josh






with such greats as Professor Cheers and color changing wands. A very good act choreographed to music. We will be looking for great things from Josh. Next up was

Grant Ives


Ron Perez whose story book character persona had the kids and adults all laughing throughout his entire

St. Louis legend has it that St. Louis was named **Ring 1 vs.2** because of its first President, Andy Buel. Buel suggested to the IBM Board that the local clubs be named Rings vs. assemblies, clubs etc. The basis for this was the new International Brotherhood of Magicians brought and united the magical groups together as in the magical effect, the Chinese Linking Rings.


Upon arriving they found that Jerry Fraley, President of Ring 37, and Wayne Clemons and the Ring 37 crew, already

An American woman, **Nancy Johnston**, invented and patented the hand-cranked ice cream freezer (a similar concept to a butter churn, but with ice and salt packed around the outside) in 1843, and in 1851 the first ice cream "factory" (using manually operated churns) was set up by **Jacob Fussell** in Baltimore, USA.

The first commercial ice-making machine was invented in Australia in 1855, and refrigeration and mechanization of the ice cream manufacturing process took place in the 1880's and 1890's. The invention of the homogenizer by August Gaulin (France) in 1899 allowed a much smoother ice cream texture, and the brine freezer (1902) permitted faster freezing.

At the St. Louis (USA) World Fair in 1904, a Syrian waffle vendor named E.A. Hamwi is credited with introducing the ice cream cone, when he started rolling waffles into cone shapes for the benefit of an ice cream vendor in an adjoining booth.

The "**Popsicle**" is said to have been accidentally invented in 1905 when fruit cordial was frozen on a particularly cold night, with stirring sticks still in place.

Prohibition in the USA (1919) resulted in many bars being converted into ice cream parlours, and ice cream's popularity

boomed.

Ice cream novelties as we now know them began to appear in the 1920's - the first chocolate-coated ice cream bar ("I-Scream Bar") appeared in the USA in 1919 (later re-named the "Eskimo Pie"), and the first ice cream on a stick was the

first ice cream on a stick was the "Good Humor Bar" (1920, USA). Both products are still on the market, as is the Popsicle!

The first mechanical horizontal batch ice cream freezer was invented by H.H. Miller of Canton, Ohio, USA, and about 1926 the first continuous freezer was commercialized by Clarence Vogt of Louisville, Kentucky, USA.

Many further refinements to manufacturing equipment have taken place since then, but by this stage the basic technology was in place to produce the ice cream that we know and love today.
