Bizarre Magic Bizarre Magic

Your host for this evening will be Mr. Steve Finkelstein

If you do not know what to expect at this meeting, the information below will clear it up for you.

Bizarre Magic, or Bizarre Magick, is a branch of <u>stage magic</u>, or conjuring, like stage illusions, <u>sleight of hand</u>, or children's shows. The major difference is that bizarre magic uses storytelling and word play to a much greater degree, and less emphasis is placed on the manual dexterity of the performer or the complexity of his equipment. It is more like watching small, intimate theater than a traditional magic show. Bizarre Magicians often use authentic and sometimes antique artifacts in their presentations. Unlike traditional magic where you may see many magicians performing similar effects, most Bizarre Magick is completely unique to each performer.

Among many people, there is the often times mistaken impression that bizarre magic must be ghoulish, ghostly, or ghastly.

Bizarre magic is normally done as close-up magic, for a few people at a time, but it can be done as a club show or even as a stage act, depending on the routine, the props, and the performer



Shaken - Watch as the spots on the back of a playing card visually rearrange themselves to form an outline of the selected card!



What an evening ... packed full of fun, great entertainment and awards! The best place to start would be at the beginning of the evening so as not to sleight anything that happened that night.



Halloween Legends

Witches have had a long history with Halloween. Legends tell of witches gathering twice a year when the seasons changed, on April 30 - the eve of May Day and the other was on the eve of October 31 - All Hallow's Eve.

The witches would gather on these nights, arriving on broomsticks, to celebrate a party hosted by the devil. Superstitions told of witches casting spells on unsuspecting people, transforming them into different forms and causing other magical mischief.

It was said that to meet a witch you had to put your clothes on wrong side out and you had to walk backwards on Halloween night. Then at midnight you would see a witch.

When the early settlers came to America, they brought along their belief in witches. In America, the legends of witches spread and mixed with the beliefs of others, the Native Americans - who also believed in witches, and then later with the black magic beliefs of the African slaves.

The black cat has long been associated with witches. Many superstitions have evolved about cats. It was believed that witches could change into cats. Some people also believed that cats were the spirits of the dead.

One of the best-known superstitions is that of the black cat. If a black cat was to cross your path you would have to turn around and go back because many people believed that if you continued bad luck would strike you.

A burning a candle inside a jack-o-lantern on Halloween keeps evil spirits and demons at bay.

If a candle suddenly goes out by itself on Halloween, as though by breath or wind, it is believed that a ghost has come to call.

It is believed that if a person lights a new orange-colored candle at midnight on Halloween and lets it burn until sunrise, he or she will be the recipient of good luck.

To cast a headless shadow or no shadow at all is still believed by many folks in the United States and Europe to be an omen of death in the course of the next year.

A person born on Halloween can both see and talk to spirits.

Ring 1 member, Michael Henry might have solved the Mystery of the Lady in White!

ST CHARLES GHOST TOURS

Main Street St Charles seems to have more than its share of mysterious

manifestations. Just glimpsed glows, unexplained noises, and flitting shadows at the edge of vision. Lights, sights, sounds and even ghostly smells have been reported along here.

From 1789 to 1853, St. Charles Borromeo cemetery was located in what is now the 400 block of South Main. According to church records, the graveyard was closed in 1853 and the stones were moved to the new graveyard (the current location) on Randolph Street. However, there are no records to indicate any effort was made to move the bodies to the new location.

Block 28 – between Jackson and Tompkins – is also the site of another ambitious project. An attempt is being made to reconstruct a copy of the Old (original) Borromeo Church, a building that will not "rest in peace." The log church is being rebuilt on its original location and seems to be drawing interesting visitors even before it is finished.

The Lady in White, a young woman in what seems to be a wedding dress has been seen here a few times. She stands quietly, with her head down almost as if in prayer. Who is this mysterious visitor? Items in the research collection of Dr. Michael Henry could provide an explanation.

A letter written by Hiram Berry (of St Charles), dated September 1822, tells of "a nice-looking woman that lives on the same march with me." He tells of a new son, born healthy, but she died a short time later. According to Hiram, "she was buried in her wedding dress, cream trimmed in white lace, the only nice dress she owned. She looked beautiful with her head turned to one side and a smile on her face."

In April of 2006, Dr. Michael Henry began to offer guided tours of Main Street St Charles. A life long resident of St Charles he has been investigating the paranormal for more than 30 years. He has written 3 books and more than two hundred articles. He has been a teacher for more than 25 years and currently teaches at Lindenwood University.

To potentially meet (or smell) something cold in the night, sign up for one of the Friday or Saturday excursions by calling 314-374-6102 (reservations are required); tours cost \$20 (\$16 for seniors), and they depart from outside the Saint Charles County Historical Society (101 South Main Street) at 7:00, 9:30 and Midnight.
